Dear Mrs. Barbut,

We applaud your recognition of the grave threat climate change poses to global coastal and marine environments, particularly the adverse impacts on coral reefs, fisheries and food security, foremost impacting vulnerable communities in developing countries. The Global Environment Facility's support of the Save Our Species (SOS) initiative and climate change mitigation projects in developing countries represents the constructive and positive direction that is required to bring our blue planet on a long-term sustainable path.

As members of civil society, representing marine environmental stakeholders, we write to provide our recommendations and support for addressing climate change through including natural coastal and marine ecosystems into climate change mitigating strategies.

The Earth's oceans are critically important to the global carbon cycle. Our oceans, and the coastal and marine ecosystems they support, are natural carbon sinks. In fact, healthy ocean ecosystems represent the largest active carbon sink on Earth. Scientists recognize that some coastal and marine ecosystems, including tidal marshlands, mangrove ecosystems and seagrass meadows, play a natural role in absorbing carbon from the atmosphere.

Sadly, the global loss of coastal ecosystems is occurring at an alarming rate – as much as 7% annually, and most could be gone within two decades. Such degradation decreases the ocean's existing carbon stock and its natural capacity to mitigate climate change.

Healthy coastal and marine ecosystems are also vital to the livelihood and cultural identity of many coastal and island communities, and critically important to marine biodiversity and many endangered species.

We ask the Global Environment Facility to consider the following recommendations:

- Include coastal and marine ecosystem conservation and restoration in GEF funded climate change mitigation projects;
- Support scientific research coupled with socio-economic analysis that further explores and develops natural marine ecosystem solutions to climate change; and
- Support the coordination and development of protocols and methodologies that include coastal and marine carbon sinks in greenhouse gas mitigation efforts.

Thank you for considering our views, and for your continued commitment to addressing the threat of climate change.
